Notes from the 2024 April OHIO YAB meeting breakout session:

a.) How adults share information is important:

- "People told me to budget, but not why it's important. It feels very limiting to not be told how, why and what the expenses of an adult are, and how to do finances for a stable adult life."
- "One thing that dims the light is when adults criticize you for not budgeting without showing you how."

b.) Youth shared tips with one another:

- Bills are important. Pay yourself first. Rainy day money.
- Bank account. Saving case is okay, too.
- Making a budgeting plan and/or a savings goals.
- "Every time I get paid, I split the check or set money aside for the important stuff, like bills."
- "I recently opened up a second bank account. What I learned is that, if you don't trust the foster parent you are with, don't let her have access to your bank account. She took \$800 from me, and then kicked me out of her home."

c.) What they would like to know more about:

- "I'd like to know more about credit I understand it, but I don't."
- "I'd like to know more about taxes."
- "It's hard to save money. I think at age 16, foster youth should all be allowed to have bank accounts."
- "There's not enough emphasis on how to cover medical expenses, such as insulin for diabetes."
- How to budget for self-preservation
